Exhibit to showcase artist's work inspired by her new island home

he was bom in California, took bronze-casting classes in Holland, gazed upon famous paintings in France and sculpted marble in Italy. But Dawn Lees Reyes says she never really felt at home until she came to Guam. The 43-year-old artist, now a resident of a beachside home in Inarajan, says when she landed on Guam, she knew it was where she wanted to hang her hat for the last time.

"I've been traveling for the last 18 years," Reyes says.
"But since coming here, there was a sigh of relief when I realized this is where I feel comfortable."
About 75 of her paintings, drawings and sculptures will be shown in her debut exhibit "Finally Home," which opens at 6:30 p.m. Aug. 4 at the Nissan Infinity showroom in Upper Tumon. The exhibit runs for two weeks.

Reyes' artwork takes many forms, from sculptures and oil paintings to pastels and silk paintings. She says she has no favorite medium, instead lets the subject matter dictate how it will be pre-

sented.

Her work has many themes, among them nature, the female

form and current events.

Reyes says she got her "real education" from her travels through

Europe.
"It's not just stuff you see in a book," she says. "There it is, right

in front of you."

Since moving to Guam about two and a half years ago, Reyes has done many pieces with Guam motifs, like local legends or the

Pacific ocean. Reyes puts her own twists on the legends, however. For example, one of her paintings combined the legend of "The Maiden Who Saved Guarn" with the Roman goddess Diana the Huntress, complete with a Roman arch in the background.

Besides painting, Reyes teaches eighth-grade art at Inarajan Middle School. She says she wants to play a more active role in Guarn's art community and expand art education on the island by opening her own art school in the southern part of the island.

Reyes seems to have found her niche here.

"When I hung (my work) up in my new home," she says. "It seemed like I had been doing it all along just to put it there."
